Crocker Memorial Church Roof Repairs in Progress

Thanks to the enormous generosity of HSOSC members and community friends of history, the annual appeal will come in at \$16,380, a record for our organization. The total includes \$4,000, which came to us as a matching grant challenge, and \$2,000 that is a corporate match to a member's donation. This outpouring of concern for Sarasota's historic Crocker Memorial Church means we could call in the Sutter Roofing experts and start the work to stabilize and improve the metal roof on the Crocker. Bravo to all members and to community friends for demonstrating such timely and important support.

Targeting the roof of the church building is part of an long-term board strategy to follow a maintenance schedule that has been recommended to us by a professional historic preservation contractor. A special Buildings and Grounds committee of board members and members at large of HSOSC has been established and they are diligently working to establish priorities and then allocate the funds to get the work done.

Built in 1901 by Peter Crocker and his friends as a place of worship and community gathering place, the Crocker Memorial Church has been moved three times and is now under the protection of the Historical Society of Sarasota County. Owned by the City of Sarasota, the historic building in Pioneer Park is used for public events, weddings, memorial services, social and civic club meetings, business seminars and by HSOSC members for organization programs and membership meetings. As a heritage building it is a model of adaptive use.

A grant from the Frances T. Borne Fund at the **Community Foundation** of Sarasota County allowed us to replace the rotten window sills on the outside of the **Crocker Memorial** Church. The Crocker is used by the Historical Society and the community just about every day of the week. And it's become quite popular for weddings and small receptions.

The tour held this January earned \$1,000 for HSOSC and it was a wonderful friend-raiser for our organization and for the Ringling Museum. Message from the President of HSOSC




The Historical Society of Sarasota County is always looking for additional activities for its members. Accordingly, we have added two new programs this year. The **Brown Bag Book Luncheon**, held at 11:30 a.m. on the third Wednesday of the month, brings authors of books about local and regional subjects to the Crocker Memorial Church for discussions, slide shows or other presentations, as well as a chance to answer participants' questions and to sell and sign their books. the back porch of the Bidwell-Wood House. We supply beverages. Admission is free for HSOSC members and \$5 for non-members. (Annual single membership to HSOSC is only \$30).

The High Tea and Plein Air Painting event held in January earned \$1,000 for HSOSC and provided a lovely day for participants celebrating a gracious domestic ritual of tea and socializing. Thank you to **Judy Alexander** for once again organizing this popular annual event.

Additionally, one of the Plein Air artists donated a piece of art work to HSOSC to be auctioned and HSOSC realized \$200 from that. Events such as this, organized by volunteer HSOSC members, help give us community visibility, earn money to support the Bidwell-Wood House and the Crocker Memorial Church and events bring new members. In 2014, we saw membership rise by 44 new members.
